In February, AATJ's Bylaws were officially revised and we will establish a two Vice President (K-12 & College) system as well as two positions (K-12 & College) for the DEIB-Director. A new Vice president from the collegiate level will be elected this fall along with a new President-elect. Yasuko Takata-Rallings sensei has been appointed as the new DEIB director and is closely working with the current director, William Matsuzaki sensei. A DEIB-related webinar is planned to be held soon, so stay tuned.

2024年には8月初めにウィスコンシン大学マジソン校にて日本語教育国際 研究大会 (テーマ:多様性と専門性) を共催する関係で対面による春の学会 は見送る予定ですが、それに変わるような上記のオンライン「学会」を検 討中です。また、この国際大会に関しては開催地であるウィスコンシン大 学マジソン校の森先生がまとめ役となってご尽力なさっていますのでお楽 しみに。

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In March, we finally had the opportunity to meet in-person at the AATJ Spring Conference in Boston, and most participants enjoyed face to face sessions and reunion after the long hiatus. Many teachers could not attend due to scheduling conflicts on Thursday, as well as financial difficulties so we will make sure that virtual workshops and conferences will continue to be held in the timely manner in the future.

There will be no AATJ Spring Conference in 2024. Instead, we are hosting "International Conference on Japanese Language Education (ICJLE)" in Madison, Wisconsin on August 1st-3rd. Please stay tuned!

4月に入ってやや春らしさを増したとはいえ時折雪が舞う地元シカゴ郊外ではNational Council Of Less Commonly Taught Languages (NCOLCTL)の年次大会が開催され、26年前の立ち上げ当時に参加して以来で、今回はNCOLCTLの傘下組織の一つであるAATJを代表して出席しました。日本語は大学での外国語科目履修者としては5番目に多いのですが、Less Commonly Taught Languages (マイナー言語)の定義はK-12の外国語科目としてどのぐらい普及しているかが指標となっています。「スペイン語、ドイツ語、フランス語」以外の言語ということでしょうか。全米各地でK-12の日本語プログラムが存続の危機に直面している今、言語関係の教師が協力して全米での言語教育の拡充を目指していきたいものです。今回の高見前会長の参加教師全員を前にした。Exploration of Teaching Diversity, Inclusion, and Equity in the Language Classroom。と題した講演に刺激された教師も多かったようです。この学会には多くの大学院生やまだ教師歴の浅い若い先生方が参加されているので、日本語関係の大学院生や大学のジュニアファカルティにもお勧めです。今回は多くの韓国語関係の発表が目をひきました。2024年の春はAATJの春の学会はありませんから、このNCOLCTL学会は全国レベルでの発表の機会としても最適ではないでしょうか。来年の春もこのシカゴ郊外で開催される予定なので日本語関係の発表が増えることを期待しています。ACTFLのPatel会長とNCOLCTLのSchleicher代表理事とも懇談しました。

In April, I had a great opportunity to attend the annual conference of NCOLCTL near Chicago as an AATJ representative. AATJ has been an important board member since the establishment of the National Council of Less Commonly Taught Languages (NCOLCTL). AATJ Immediate Past President, Tomoko Takami sensei, presented "Exploration of Teaching Diversity, Inclusion, and Equity in the Language Classroom" at one of the Plenary Sessions, and her presentation received positive feedback from many participants. There were many graduate students (future teachers) and junior faculty of colleges and universities who presented many different topics enthusiastically. In particular, many Korean language related sessions caught my attention, and I myself am thinking of making a presentation next year, as we will not hold the AATJ Spring Conference. I strongly encourage you to consider presenting some Japanese related issues at this conference in 2024.





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During the conference, I was lucky to have a chance to talk with current ACTFL President, Akash Patel as well as NCOLCTL Executive Director, Antonia Schleicher (with my rusty Swahili).



教員にとりましても、多くの生教材を取り入れながらの語学学習のあり方を模索する機会ともなっております。(田代友子先生)



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Language Advocacy Day 2023

JNCL-NCLIS is the Joint National Committee for Languages and the National Council for Languages and International Studies, the most powerful advocate language educators have in Washington, D.C. Each February, JNCL-NCLIS organizes Language Advocacy Day (https://www.languagepolicy.org/lad), an event that brings together language advocates and representatives of organizations such as AATJ from all over the country to push their state senators and local congresspeople to support legislation that will strengthen programs and increase multilingualism in the United States.

The mission of JNCL-NCLIS is to "assure that Americans have the opportunity to learn English and at least one other language". Language Advocacy Day is our chance to speak with a unified, organized voice to the decision makers. Attendees represent their individual states as well as specific organizations. This year, AATJ was represented by Susan Schmidt, Junko Tokuda Simpson, and myself. And, former AATJ Advocacy Director Kazumi Yamashita-lverson, was there representing Connecticut language teachers.

We each joined our individual state's teams to persuade our state senators and congressional representatives to support the following legislation and initiatives that impact language education nationwide, asking them to:

- Support the World Language Education Assistance Program (World LEAP), which would establish an innovative world language grant program at the US Dept. of Education.
- Support the BEST (Bilingual Educational Seal and Teaching) Act, to provide funding for equitable implementation of the Seal of Biliteracy for ALL students.
- Support and pass the reintroduced Paul Simon Study Abroad Act, which would increase the overall number of undergraduate students studying abroad, as well as increase opportunities to more minority, first generation, community college, and students with disabilities.
- Approve additional funding for the World Language Advancement and Readiness Act (WLARA), which provides multi-year grants for innovative language programs at K-12 school districts with ROTC programs, with 75% of the funding going to programs for languages considered critical to national security.
- Approve additional funding for the recently established Native American Language Resource Center at the Dept. of Education.

In addition, if the legislator was not already a member of the America's Languages Caucus, we made a personal appeal to join. Is your local lawmaker a member? Check the list at the bottom of this link to see if your congressperson or senator has signed on. If not, ask them to join! https://www.languagepolicy.org/americaslanguages

Since 2020, Language Advocacy Day has been held virtually, so no one has to leave home to join this important effort. Being able to meet one on one in a Zoom with your state representative about the importance of language education is a very special opportunity. I hope others will consider attending, because each one of us is an advocate, not just for Japanese, but for the teaching of all languages.



JNHS Raises the Next Generation Leaders - Los Gatos HS Spotlight

It's May. This is our most hectic and stressful time of the year. But it is also time for us to celebrate how much our students learned and what we, as teachers, accomplished. JNHS will help your program to be more successful and stable, and the officers and members will help you get through a hectic and challenging school year. Let me share a quote from one of this year's INHS Co-President, Sarah Aceves, a senior, about her experience with the INHS at Los Gatos High School.

"Throughout my whole high school career, I was a part of the Japanese National Honors Society (JNHS). Each and every year I hold a special memory and I am so happy that I was able to participate as an active member all four years of my high school life. Even when seniors would leave the next year, there were always new members who joined the club and it was truly amazing to see everyone come together again and build friendships and a close community with everyone's similar interests. Throughout COVID and quarantine, the club still persevered and held on tightly. JNHS is a place to learn, build community, and gain experience for volunteering and taking part in big events such as the annual Haiku Holiday Film Faire fundraiser. JNHS has become a big inspiration to me to explore more about Japanese culture and how I could use my learnings into my life. JNHS is a welcoming home and I'm so grateful for being able to be a part of the beautiful society."

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CC at UNT: Go North Texan! To a Brighter Stage JNHS - University of North Texas Spotlight

2023 marks the 14th year since the establishment of the Japanese National Honor Society (JNHS) at the University of North Texas (UNT) in Spring 2010. We have inducted over 120 members into our local chapter since then. Our inductees go stronger in their career fields in the US, Japan, and the rest of the world. Through the time of crisis during the pandemic, our chapter has survived its livelihood and is even stronger, especially since the face-to-face activities resumed on campus and beyond.

Activities every semester of the year vary: Community outreach, fundraiser, language and cultural events, volunteering at local festivals, Presentation Day, etc. The students have started more outreach activities recent years. They have visited a nursing home in the community to share Japanese culture; they have also reached a business in the community to coordinate a fundraiser together.

The members of the JNHS feeder student organization sometimes serve as assistants of Japanese teachers in class or at conversation tables. They sometimes tutor and peer-mentor fellow Japanese language students. The members are serving in various aspects of the learner community as well as assisting the demands of the Japanese program at UNT. The students are certainly a vital group to Japanese learners and inspire and support the growing number of students who major in Japanese at UNT. Some of them are hired as the Japanese program Departmental lab TA and/or tutors to gain valuable teaching experience. Some volunteer to assist the activities of the Japanese program and instructors to gain experiences through this service.

JNHS at UNT has thus active members in the feeder student organization. 20+ students are registered in the organization in the current academic year. In addition to the strong number of the community, study abroad students from Japan often join the weekly meetings / activities, which makes the participants numbers average 30-40 each time, according to the officers.





One of the highlights of the activities each semester is Presentation Day. Students have started to conduct a poster session styled presentation since Fall 2022, instead of the traditional "one presenter at a time" in the front. The poster session style drew a lot of audiences in active movements in the given time. The Japanese instructors are also invited to the Presentation Day and able to visit and talk to the presenters whose interests range from linguistics, literature to a variety of Japanese traditional and contemporary culture. Some students demonstrate their artistic talents, too, in the drawing and illustrations on their posters. This opportunity of language use is also designed for beginning level students. They can select and recite their favorite poems, haiku, read aloud a story of their choice, or recite their short essay that they created for the semester with visual aids to boost communication.

There are students who created video presentations and agreed to share their interests in kanji, Japanese study tips, or on the topic of IT genre.

2022-23 Advanced Leadership Training Report

The first cohort of the Advanced Leadership Training program had its final meeting via Zoom on April 29, 2023. The group first met more than two years ago, and worked in pairs and groups over many months to plan and carry out projects that contributed to their schools, their state teachers' organizations, or their community.

This program, sponsored by AATJ and the Japan Foundation-Los Angeles, began on November 6th-7th, 2021, with two-day follow-up sessions held on February 19th-20th, 2022, and on July 30th, 2022. During the final follow-up meeting on April 29th, each group reported on their successful outcomes and the lessons learned from the activities, challenges, and strategies for sustainability.

These groups faced the challenges of virtual collaboration head-on, and reported many successes along with disappointments and frustrations.

2023 JUNIOR JAPAN BOWL REPORT

全米の小中学生による日本語と日本文化の知識を競うナショナル・ジュニアジャパンボウルが4月28日(金)にオンラインで開催されました。第7回目の開催となる今年は、全米八州にある合計24校より380名の生徒が参加し、熱戦が繰り広げられました。ジュニアジャパンボウルはチーム戦で行われ、生徒は二人~三人のチームで、Kahootに参加します。今年のトピックは、日本語(挨拶・教室で使う表現・擬音語・擬態語・ことわざ・漢字)、文学(昔話)、歴史(飛鳥・奈良・平安・鎌倉)、宗教(寺・神社)、大衆文化(ゲーム・伝承遊び)、学校文化でした。さらに新たな試みとして、順位を競う大会後に、レベルごとの参加者がランダムにチーム分かれ、大会の問題を復習しながらミッション達成を遂行するという機会を設けました。こちらは、kahootゲームモードを使用しましたが、学校や州を超えて全員参加の一体感を感じることができたようです。対面授業が本格的に再開した今年度の大会では、メンバーが集まって参加するチームが増え、大会後のアンケートでもチームメートと助け合った楽しさに関するコメントが多数寄せられました。

MAATJ地域の日本語教育関係者とK-16の教員が構成するJ-LEARN(Japaese Language Education Advocacy & Resource Network)は、DEIへの配慮から、参加費無料を基本とし、学校ごとの参加チーム数の制限も設定ぜず、マスコットもジェンダーフリーを意識したものへとデザインを改めました。また、先生方が教室で使いやすく、また生徒が自主学習しやすいGoogle Slideのスタディーガイド、さらに、トピックごとのQuizletやKahoot等をボランティアが作成し、全教材を公開提供しました。また、大会前には無料の勉強会やソフトウェア練習会を設け、参加者のサポートを行いました。

このような開かれた大会の開催を実現できたのは、ワシントン日米協会、国際交流基金ロサンゼルス日本文化センター、ワシントン商工会財団、ジョージワシントン大学東アジア国立リソースセンター、及びブルボンUSAをはじめとする多数の団体・企業の皆様によるもので、主催者一同心より感謝申し上げます。今年は、日本大使館より個人・チーム上位5チームに日英語での賞状が贈られ、サポーターの皆様のご寄付により参加者全員に日本のお菓子や文房具が配布されました。また、大会開会式ではワシントン日米協会が主催する高校生の全米ジャパンボウル参加者からの応援メッセージが届けられ、またジャパンボウルの同窓生がロゴやマスコットのデザインを担当したことにより、小学生から高校生までのジャパンボウルの繋がりを感じる大会となりました。

最後に、ポストコロナの過渡期で生徒の精神的なサポートや、遅れた学習を取り戻すべく激務をこなしていらっしゃるにもかかわらず、貴重なお時間を割いて生徒のジャパンボウル参加をご支援くださいました先生方や保護者の皆様へ心よりお礼申し上げます。今後とも皆様のお声を聞きながらよりよい大会になるよう工夫を重ねて参りますので、ボランティアによる手作りの大会、そして日本が大好きな小中学生を引き続き応援してくださいますようよろしくお願いたします。

2023 JUNIOR JAPAN BOWL REPORT

The 7th National Junior Japan Bowl was held online on Friday, April 28, 2023, where elementary and junior high school students from all over the United States competed over knowledge of the Japanese language and culture. 380 students from a total of 24 schools spanning eight states participated in this year's event. A fierce competition unfolded. The Junior Japan Bowl is a team competition. Students participate in teams of two to three players via Kahoot digital games. The topics this year covered the Japanese language (greetings, classroom expressions, onomatopoeia, mimetic words, proverbs, Kanji), literature (folktales), history (Asuka, Nara, Heian, Kamakura eras), religion (temples, shrines), popular culture (modern and traditional games), and school culture. This year a new element was added to the Junior Japan Bowl. The main competition determines individual and team winners. Immediately following the main competition, participants reviewed the competition questions by playing one of the newer styles of Kahoot games (Color Kingdoms and Tallest Tower). For these games, students were randomly divided into teams, thus being able to partner with participants from other schools and states. This built a sense of unity for participants across the country. Face-to-face schooling has resumed in earnest, and the number of teams where members were able to gather and participate together has increased. From the post-tournament survey, there were many comments about how fun it was to be able to be together with team members and help one another.

J-LEARN (Japanese Language Education Advocacy & Resource Network) is composed of Japanese language education officials and K-16 teachers in the MAATJ area. Taking DEI in consideration, Junior Japan Bowl participation is free of charge, there is no limit on the number of participating teams for each school, and the mascot was changed to a gender-free design. Volunteers created Google Slide study guides that teachers can easily use in the classrooms and that students can use to study on their own. Volunteers also made separate Quizlets and Kahoots to cover the content of each topic. Addition, J-LEARN held free study sessions and software practice sessions prior to the competition to support the participants.

The Japan-America Society of Washington, D.C. The Japan Foundation Los Angeles, The Japan Commerce Association of Washington DC Foundation, George Washington University East Asia National Resource Center, Bourbon USA, and BC Mini (Iwako USA) are among the many partner organizations that make the Junior Japan Bowl possible. We would like to express our heartfelt gratitude to all the organizations that supported this event. This year, the Embassy of Japan presented certificates in Japanese and English to the top five team and individual winners. Donations of Japanese sweets and stationery from event supporters allowed all participants to receive prizes. The opening ceremony of the Junior Japan Bowl was filled with messages of support from the high schoolers who participated in the National Japan Bowl, a Japan America Society of Washington, D.C.-sponsored event. A National Japan Bowl alumni designed the logo and mascot of the Junior Japan Bowl. The connection between events is tremendous.

Finally, J-LEARN would like to express its sincere gratitude to all the teachers and parents who sacrificed their time and efforts for Junior Japan Bowl participants. This is in light of the stresses of the current post-coronavirus transitional period, which requires the hard work of providing students with mental support and educational catch-up from interrupted schooling. As J-LEARN continues to strive to incorporate feedback to improve the Junior Japan Bowl, let's together further support for student learning and understanding of Japan.

AATJ Teacher Awards – Nominations Are Open

The AATJ Teacher Awards recognize **outstanding teachers who demonstrate excellence in teaching, advocacy, and leadership in Japanese education both locally and regionally**. AATJ customarily presents the awards to the recipients during the ACTFL Annual Convention each November.

Awards are given annually in two categories:

- K-12 Level Teacher Award
- Community College/College and University Level Teacher Award.

NEXT NOMINATION DEADLINE: June 30, 2023.

In order to nominate a colleague, an AATJ member (or another nominator) completes a <u>Nomination Form</u>, assembles the required supporting documents, and submits all documents electronically to <u>aati@aati.org</u>.

A nomination includes:

- 1. A completed Nomination Form;
- 2. The candidate's CV (not to exceed 3 pages), which includes professional development activities and leadership efforts;
- 3. The nominator's letter and two additional letters of recommendation, signed and scanned

Candidates for the awards:

- must have a minimum of three years' teaching experience at the level for which they are nominated, and
- must hold a current membership in AATJ.

Nominators:

- A nominator may be anyone familiar with the nominee's teaching (e.g., a colleague, administrator, parent, or student).
- Nominators who are teachers of Japanese (language, literature, culture etc.) must be current members of AATJ.

Cheng & Tsui Professional Development Grant

The Cheng & Tsui Professional Development Grant offers financial assistance to Japanese language teachers in grades K-16, especially those new to the field, for the purpose of attending training workshops, seminars, conferences, and other local, national, or international in-service learning experiences. The grant may also be used to collaborate with a mentor teacher. Teacher training workshops and seminars attended by the applicant should be focused on pedagogy and issues of teaching and learning.

Cheng & Tsui Publishers, the sponsor of the grant, will award \$500 to the grant recipient(s).

Applicants for the Cheng & Tsui Professional Development grants should submit the following to AATJ:

- 1. An <u>application</u> describing how they would use the grant;
- 2. The amount of subsidy requested and a proposed budget (included on the application form);
- A current Curriculum Vitae.

Applicants must be current members of AATJ. Recipients are also asked to write a brief report after attending the event for which they were awarded money, summarizing their experience and what they learned.

Applications will be evaluated by a panel of reviewers selected by the American Association of Teachers of Japanese and who have no professional or personal connections with applicants.

We had over 20 colleges participate during the 2022-23 school year and had great collaboration with the schools and teachers. We are looking forward to this next school year!



- 2) Must submit a 250-word abstract (submission webpage for 2023 will be sent out later with the details)
- 3) Must be available to deliver presentation synchronously in English at the event.
- 4) May be presented solo or as a pair .
- 5) Students may use previous Japanese business projects that have not been presented in an external student conference
